# 2. DEVOTIONAL & PRAYER

Turning over a New Leaf

Whenever we think of a change in seasons we tend to look to the calendar to get a birds eye view of the "plan". I'm not sure who's plan we think it is, but instinctively we believe the seasons follow suit when the calendar day arrives, and the final week of the season passes. Beneath the surface of our curiosity there is a deeper desire to create or speculate on a set of expectations to gamble with. Although outwardly we celebrate newness and spontaneity, there is a darker craving in most to repeat anything we perceive as success or an advantage. Typically you don't set expectations on what a new season holds until there are clear indications of how it's going to happen. We call them signs of the times, there are many bible examples of this, for instance:

The fig tree cursed with no fruit. The Jews couldn't see what Jesus was going to do because they were unwilling to change their expectations. And the church couldn't see what was coming because they refused to believe there was a future ahead of them. How challenging it must have been for the exiles of Daniel's generation to believe God was still working in the lives of their neighbors when it seemed he was finished with His own people. Consider these scriptures:

- Luke 13:6-9 (ESV) [Jesus' parable]: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came seeking fruit ON IT AND FOUND NONE. AND HE SAID TO THE VINEDRESSER, 'LOOK, FOR THREE YEARS NOW I HAVE COME SEEKING FRUIT ON THIS FIG TREE, AND I FIND NONE. CUT IT DOWN. WHY SHOULD IT USE UP THE GROUND?' AND HE ANSWERED HIM, 'SIR, LET IT ALONE THIS YEAR ALSO, UNTIL I DIG AROUND IT AND PUT ON MANURE. THEN IF IT SHOULD BEAR FRUIT NEXT YEAR, WELL AND GOOD; BUT IF NOT, YOU CAN CUT IT DOWN.""
- Hebrews 6:9-12 (ESV) [Paul]: "Though we speak in this way, yet in your case, beloved, **we feel sure of better** THINGS—THINGS THAT BELONG TO SALVATION. FOR GOD IS NOT UNJUST SO AS TO OVERLOOK YOUR WORK AND THE LOVE THAT YOU HAVE SHOWN FOR HIS NAME IN SERVING THE SAINTS, AS YOU STILL DO. AND WE DESIRE EACH ONE OF YOU TO SHOW THE SAME EARNESTNESS TO HAVE THE FULL ASSURANCE OF HOPE UNTIL THE END, SO THAT YOU MAY NOT BE SLUGGISH, BUT IMITATORS OF THOSE WHO THROUGH FAITH AND PATIENCE INHERIT THE PROMISES."

We're a long ways from actually knowing WHEN God's galactic appraisal of humanity will ensue with Great Tribulation. However, citing the enthusiasm of MacArthur his zealous de-facto minions, there is notable haste amongst pretentious and privileged evangelical Christians to: (a) voice clear disillusionment for the felt lethargy of the "Western Church"; and to (b) gaslight sincere believers into their own voluntary self-exclusion from heaven itself - claiming that the church of Christ may number a mere fraction of confessing Believers who

worship Christ in the West. It's a shame really that these self-appointed superiors of the Western Church lack the inspiring confidence of the early apostles who (whilst dodging persecution, starvation and shaking down their own prejudices against Greeks, barbarians and newcomers) still managed to assert generous portions of enthusiasm, confidence and faith in the good Lord for the diaspora of persevering saints they consorted with (Hebrews 6:9,10). The apostle Paul experienced fierce and subtle opposition from many of his own converts and yet he still refused such pretentious negativity to seep back into the church. Mindful of the Lord's clear reminder to "Judge not, lest you be judged" (Matthew 7:1), Paul countered such hasty malcontent with "the Lord knows those who are his" (2 Timothy 2:19). So why are evangelicals resorting to frustrated and "judgy" scoldings to spurn and scorn God's work? Paul prompted joy and love in others:

Philippians 1:3-10 (ESV) — "I <u>Thank my God in all my remembrance of you</u>, always in every prayer of mine for you all <u>Making my prayer with Joy</u>, because of your <u>Partnership</u> in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure of this, that <u>He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion</u> at the <u>Day</u> of Jesus Christ. It is right for me to feel this way about <u>you all</u>, because I hold you in my heart, for you are all <u>Partakers with me of grace</u>... For God is my witness, how I yearn for you all with the <u>Affection of Christ Jesus</u>. And <u>It is my prayer that your love may abound</u> more and more, with knowledge and all discernment, so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the <u>Day</u> of Christ..."

Christian discipleship leads us all to some kind of internal conflict. Jesus indicated that following him would bring the sword of division into our closest relationships (Matthew 10:34-39). Yet the searing of sanctification cannot be a backlash of personality. For among us "gentle evangelicals" there are deep inclinations and fervent protests that brew and recoil on the basis of mere personal preference alone. Only with great hesitation would an evangelical leader entreat the congregation, "what color of carpet goes best?" James gives a stern reminder (James 4:1 ESV):

■ "What causes quarrels and fights among you? Is it not this, that your passions are at war within you?"

There are those who would <u>disqualify certain people</u> to better manage the group harbouring a bias for the traits, limitations or decisions that only a few can afford to make. Some driven by another personality, see this confrontation as their opportunity to <u>associate with high performers</u>, so they can associate with the "better half" (eg. *Peter & the circumcision party*: Galatians 2:12). Another conflict driven by personality is a grasp for influence, where some seek to draw others to themselves and use that majority to wield their own influence and gain power. <u>But there is another way</u> that we can face this conflict together. If we band together, walking deeply into the challenges of life to the convergence where (while huddled together) we confront our misaligned values, and those selfish drivers that impulsively launch us forward or yard us back – this kind of confrontation is the epic partnership of believers who overcome the real monster of sin, together.

■ Hosea 10:12 (ESV) — "Sow for yourselves <u>RIGHTEOUSNESS</u>; **REAP** STEADFAST <u>LOVE</u>; **BREAK UP** YOUR <u>FALLOW GROUND</u>, <u>FOR IT IS THE TIME TO SEEK THE LORD</u>, THAT HE MAY COME AND <u>RAIN</u> <u>RIGHTEOUSNESS UPON YOU</u>."

When Jesus returns to claim his bride, we've already been told he'll be looking for the ones who've managed to stay busy, tending to his fields and faithful in his work (Matthew 24:44-45).

■ 1 Thessalonians 5:11-14 (ESV) — "Therefore **encourage** one another and **build** one another up, just as you are doing... **respect** those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and **esteem** them very highly in love because of their work. **Be at peace among yourselves**. And we urge you, brothers, **admonish** the idle, **encourage** the fainthearted, **help** the weak, **be patient with them all**.."

Spring is coming, still winter clings to the last blast of its fury. It's time for us to climb out of our thicket, and move out of our shelter. When we cling to laurels, the Lord calls for intervention. Perhaps this challenge of soul-shaping discipleship is meant to be too steep for going it alone. Maybe it's time for us all to turn over a new leaf... and start walking into these battles together!

May He give us all, more grace!

# 4. FINANCIAL REPORTS


What do you see when you look at these Income / Expense and Budget statements? A boring page of numbers? Gibberish you'll never understand? Or an exciting drama, a mystery, a love story, a comedy, a tragedy, or science fiction? Perhaps a more accurate description is a foreign film, with sub-titles that tells of the collective hopes, dreams and desires of our congregation. It's a story that began when the leadership and congregation prayerfully sought God's leading for: the mission of this church; the practical plans for ministry, worship and salvation; and how the resources (that God provided) would be used to become a light in our community. There are two chapters in this story: Income and Expenses. They're of equal value and importance. Income is one resource; our time and talents to essential its use. The headings are on the left side of the page, such as offering and expenses, with the sub-headings of worship, community outreach, etc. These are brief descriptions of how we're fulfilling God's plan and using resources to do it.

Park Drive's story continues... This year's chapter, number 2024, of Park Drive's story is a good one and it comes with a picture. At the 2023 AGM (March 10<sup>th</sup>, 2024) we passed a budget that reflected a small increase in salaries for staff and an increase for MISSIONS (local, community & benevolence activities) thru grants for outreach and support of the unhoused in Oliver and Okanagan Falls. We were blessed with a 2<sup>nd</sup> grant of \$10,000 for a total of \$20,000 for the year, that's \$10,000 more than budgeted for.

This year's Income budget is increased to include a grant of \$23,370 for support to Seniors. We will again receive funds that will allow us to increase the Church's presence in the community. Correspondingly the Salaries and Overhead Expenses are increased to facilitate the activities related to the new Seniors Grant. Also, there are budget increases for Rental Income as community use of our building continues to increase and a small increase in the Offering Income (1.3%). Although our Offerings fell slightly behind budget last year, our congregation is growing. Included is a graph comparing the 2023/2024 Expenditures by Budget Category to illustrate that Park Drive's commitment to increasing its community presence is being realized. As indicated by the 5-fold increase in the MISSION category. It is difficult to reflect all of the funds are being used for reaching into our community, in a financial report, so, please keep in mind that budget categories, such as SALARIES, FACILITIES, ADMINISTRATION and WORSHIP also support our community presence. This budget is presented for your prayerful consideration and support.

Summary: In Ministry Everybody is always building a team: a Staff team, a board team. Over time, church leadership realizes that team building is an essential skill. The theme of this message is: "Why do some teams win and most don't?" Two team building keys are dominant:

- Winning teams have winning players and losing teams have gifted players. When watching Basketball All Star teams east & west those all-star teams would never be able to beat the season's NBA championship team even though they have better players.
- 30-year study of European, Canadian and American businesses, tracking the progress of people whom everybody thought were going to go to the top and asked this question: why did some make it to the top and what was common about them? and why were others derailed and what was common about them? The study reported: 16 success factors, 16 derailment factors; but we've honed in on the top two derailment and the top two success factors.

**#1** derailment factor of why people (that they thought would go to the top didn't) was <u>poor</u> <u>relationship skills</u>: they didn't play well in the sandbox and if they didn't play well in the sandbox, they might have all kinds of <u>gifting</u> they might have all <u>kinds</u> of <u>other</u> things but once they join the team the chemistry derailed them.

#2 derailment factor was a lack of flexibility; when things began to change they didn't know how to change. A prophecy about the future: it will be completely different than any of us think

• 1 Cor. 9:19-23 Paul becomes all things to all people in order to save some = flexibility

- 1 Cor, 13:1-3 "though I speak with tongues of angels, if I have not love, I have nothing"
- The next success trait is this: winning teams guard the gate and losing teams let anyone in.
- Jesus did not give everybody an opportunity; when the demoniac wanted to follow him and join him, Jesus said no, you can't do it. To the women at the well he said no you've got to go back... there were 12 disciples, but there were also the 3.
- Never ignore a lack of character because of an abundance of **giftedness** when you're guarding the gate. you can't have a winning team when you have a great player that has a spiritual issue. You're opening the door up for the **Achan like issues** (Josh. 7:20); you're going to lose some battles you can't understand.
- Never ignore a lack of people skills because of an abundance of Bible knowledge or Zeal, they're going to freak out the Sheep!
- Watchdogs: when you're guarding the gate watch out for the Christian Pitbull and Watchdog: that are protecting poor baby Jesus. They don't realize he grew up! Their mission in life is to protect poor baby Jesus and he's grown up; he's a lion!
- When you see somebody's contentious, <u>they are contentious</u>. And just because they love you now doesn't mean they're not going to turn on you later. In 1 Timothy 3:3 the list of qualifications says, one who has spiritual oversight <u>cannot be contentious</u>.

#3 Winning teams make Unity a priority. They make Unity a priority whereas losing teams treat it as an Afterthought.

- Brothers can fight, can give one another black eyes, and later in the afternoon they're playing and laughing. But strangers remember everything said and everything done.
- Unity is not an afterthought. We have to have the guts to cut out disunity when it shows up; cut out the cancer of disunity. Titus says you warn a factitious man once, you warn a factitious person twice and then you kick them out. Often we are not willing to cut out the cancer of disunity because we're afraid of the collateral damage.
- #4 Winning teams focus on their mission losing teams focus on their successes. If you're not careful you'll lose your mission and focus on your success and our successes are not always aligned with our mission. Beware of something called <u>Mission creep</u>.
- How does this Mission shift happen? The organization known as the YMCA, stands for Young Men's Christian Association. Their mission was to reach young men for Christ and they used housing in metropolitan areas and Recreation to reach young men. But over time, as culture shifted, they weren't as successful at reaching young men for Christ; but they were very good at getting people to sign up to swim and getting young girls to learn gymnastics. So they changed their mission to match their successes; recently they changed their name, they call it the Y. That's ok for an outside organization, but as a church we don't have that freedom.
- Every time you do Ministry our main Bullseye is the Great Commission, and our next Bullseye is some aspect of the Great Commission. Winning teams remember what it's all about: it's about winning championships. Never forget what your mission is: a scoring title is nice; but a championship is what we've been called for. This is the drive for winning teams versus losing teams, it's not just who has the best players, it's who has the right kind of players and the courage to keep the wrong kind out of the game.

By-Law 3.1.3. of the L.C.C.: "It shall be the duty of the nominating committee to receive submissions for each office to be filled and, after determining if such individuals are qualified and willing to serve, shall present a slate of nominees for consideration at the congregational business meeting."

TERM – Each electable term of office is valid for two years. No board member may serve more than three consecutive terms (six years) without taking reprieve of one year prior to re-election

2025 Board Status: There are eight leadteam positions, two must be filled, one re-elected.

Presentations were given by Desert Valley Hospice Society, Doctor Craven and John Nunes from Nunes-Pottinger Funeral Home. This vital information gave us directions to the required paperwork and how to effectively have our voice heard throughout the aging process. Having an Advanced Care plan informs others of the decisions you would like for the future. This is your personal choice.
